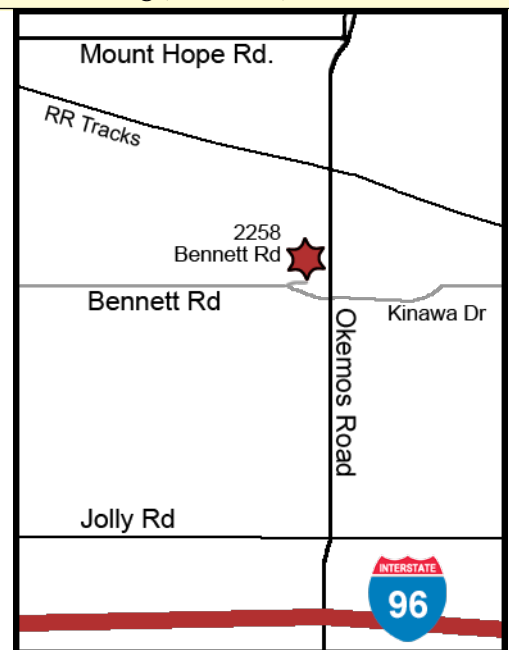

For the last two years, GLOS has held a "Round Robin" session at our January meeting. This seems to be popular with our members, so we will do it again this year. We will have a similar session with three tables, each one addressing a different orchid-growing topic:

- o Mounting Orchids: Jim Heilig
- o Terrariums: Rob Halgren
- o Preparing Plants for Shows: Dot Potter Barnett

As last year, we will have no vendor at this meeting. Instead, we will try another GLOS member's plant sale. This is an opportunity for you to pass on any divisions or seedlings you would like to share, and to purchase plants from other members. Any member may participate as a seller or a buyer. Please, inspect your plants closely for signs and symptoms of pests and disease. If something looks suspicious, leave it at home to help prevent others from taking pests home. Plants should also be as correctly labelled as possible. If the plant is an "unknown," then indicate such. Members set their own price for the plants they bring. If you are not sure what a plant is worth, ask someone at the meeting.

- GLOS will provide stickers to write the seller's name, and price on them. These stickers should be placed on the plants being sold.
- Purchases will be totaled up at a single location-a member helping the treasurer.
- The stickers will be used to tally the total sales for each selling member.
- The week following the sale, GLOS will send a check to each member who sold plants, less 20%. Proceeds from each meeting help to cover costs of bringing speakers to our meeting.
- Members selling plants have the option of placing unsold plants on the raffle table, if they so desire. There will not be a silent auction table at this meeting.
- Sales are between members, not GLOS and members.



PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE -- Rob Halgren

I hope you all had a happy holiday season. Because I teach, this is the time of year that I catch up on sleep, like a bear. Unlike a bear, I also try to re-pot all my Paphiopedilums over the holidays. The days are finally getting longer (not that my plants can tell under the lights in the barn), but for lady-slippers it is always a good time of year to re-pot, and this is the only time I have for that massive undertaking. It is taking me a bit longer this year because I'm trying to do it right. Every plant has to be handled, no skipping plants for later. I'm spraying everything as I take it out of pot, in an (probably futile) attempt to get rid of those last few pesky mealybugs. They hide in the pots! When I'm done with repotting Paphs, I'm going to pick up and spray all the other plants.

I've also made an early New Year's resolution. Our November speaker, Fred Clarke, said something that really stuck with me. To paraphrase, "if it isn't growing, throw it out. Why waste precious space on a plant that doesn't perform?" So true, but so very hard to do. We all think we can save that Phal with two limp leaves and one stubby root. And we probably can, sometimes. But is it really worth it? Every plant in your collection costs you something. True, it cost you something to purchase, but it also costs you time and money to maintain, and the space that another plant could grow in. If it doesn't grow well, it is like an old car – you can keep fixing it, but at some point you are better off getting a new one. There are some plants that I can't throw away, ones with sentimental value, given to me by old friends who I will never see again. OK, those I'll keep. But I will be ruthless with the rest of them. So, that is my resolution – this year I will compost the plants that struggle, or always seem to be infested with some pest, or just never bloom. I encourage you to try this as well. At the end of the year your collection may be smaller, but it will be better. A lot better.

Our Show (February 28-March 1) – Show Chair Pete Ostlund updated the members on plans. MINUTES OF DECEMBER 8, 2014 GLOS BOARD MEETING - submitted by Doris Asher

President Rob Halgren called the meeting to order at Doris' home at 6:58 p.m. Present: Doris Asher, Dot Barnett, Christa Forrester, Jim Heilig, Pete Ostlund, and Ioana Sonea. Guests: Leslie Behm, Marilyn Lee, and Jerrie Nichols. Absent: Bob Guilford.

GLOS Show (February 28-March 1, 2015)

Pete called on Hospitality Chair Leslie Behm, who sought help in finding someone to replace Kris Garling on the Show's Hospitality Committee. Various people promised to look for recent reports from Kris detailing her purchases for food at the Show. Leslie to follow up on list of items (perhaps rely on past reports provided by Doris) and identify specific areas where she needs assistance.

Music during the Show – Dot raised the subject of providing music at this year's Show. Much discussion; no decision.

Orchid plants (instead of corsages) for 2 local tv studios – in the absence of Renate DeZacks, Pete Ostlund is looking for someone to take an orchid in bloom and Show flyers to the local NBC and the CBS television studios as publicity on the Thursday and/or Friday morning prior to the Show. Dot to follow up with Porters to obtain flowering orchids.

Honoring our three deceased members – Doris raised the question of how best to honor Lynda Walker, Renate DeZacks, and Kris Garling, all of whom were active workers at our Shows and all of whom died since last year's Show. Dot will design a poster. The Best-of-Show Trophy will now be "The Don and Kris Garling Memorial Best-of-Show Trophy. In the Show Schedule Doris will add the line "This Show is dedicated to the memory of Lynda Walker, Renate DeZacks, and Kris Garling, all of whom died since our last Show."

AOS affiliation is now okay – Ioana has paid for GLOS for two years. (GLOS' AOS membership was set to expire before our Show.)

Black backdrops for the display area – Pete reported that Christa Forrester and Mary Henman have ordered enough cloth to make backdrops to cover the north wall of the display area.

Orchids-in-Use – Chair Marilyn Lee requested \$100 for backdrops for the orchids-in-use area. Approved.

Society exhibit – Jim will take responsibility for this.

Doris has begun spending the approved \$400 for orchid books for sale at the Show – so far, she has ordered about \$200 worth – at good discounts. She continues to solicit used orchid books from members – also to sell at the Show.

Doris reported that we have now received AOS approval for judging at our Show. The Show appears in the December issue of Orchids magazine.

Pete reported on the vendors who have committed to come. New vendors this year are Leo Schordje from Zion, IL and Barry Jones from Loveland, OH.

Treasurer's report

Current report – October 13 – December 6 – Ioana reported income of \$2,165 and expenses of \$798 for a net increase of \$1,367. Largest sources of income included memorial gifts for Kris Garling and Renate de Zacks (\$1,525), dues (\$176), and the November meeting raffle/silent auction (\$149). Expenses included \$557 for October and November speakers Norito Hasegawa and Fred Clarke, AOS affiliation for two years (\$125), and funeral flowers for Kris Garling (\$116).

Year-to-Date – July 1- December 8 – income \$3,348; expenses \$1,640 -- for net income of \$1,708.

Total assets – \$13,172, of which about \$11,000 is in nine CD's with differing maturity dates

Finance Committee – Ioana (Chair), Rob, Kris Garling . Ioana and Rob met and recommended that the budget for 2014-2015 be identical to that for 2013-2014. Approved.

Membership report – Doris – Since the October 13th report, we have received renewals for two individuals for membership year 2014-2015, one of which was for a life membership – Ann McConnelee. In addition, Michael Bukala paid ahead by buying a life membership as well. Alex Challis has also renewed. At our November meeting, new member Lynn Thelen joined – Lynn is Director Bob Guilford's daughter. We lost longtime member Kris Garling, who died. We currently have 102 members in 86 households. At this same time last year, we had 98 members in 84 households.

Life Members: 37 (36.2%)

Households getting Calypso electronically: 64 (74.4%)

Households needing paper copies: 22 (25.6%). Calypso costs us \$144 annually. This amount is partially offset by donations that some paper members contribute – now requested on dues form.

Last Year's Membership: at its largest, the 2013-2014 membership year totals were 113 people in 96 households.

Membership Roster -- For people needing one, Doris had paper copies of the current membership roster dated 11/17/2014, which Dot had distributed via email.

Away Shows

Saginaw Valley Show (Thanksgiving weekend) – Doris reported. Lynn O'Shaughnessy's design won the AOS Show Trophy for the exhibit. Ioana exhibited the best-of-show plant, which also received two AOS awards. The host Society is losing their facility which is closing; in addition, they would like to change the weekend for their Show. The Treasury has reimbursed Doris \$100 toward her expenses.

Michiana Show (October 25-26) – Marilyn set up the exhibit; Rob brought it home. Marilyn will be requesting reimbursement for her travel expenses.

Grand Valley (January 24-25) – Carol Stuht and Dot will set up; Pete will help with takedown

Michigan Orchid Society (March 28-29) – Rob may be available to prepare our exhibit for MOS March 28-29, 2015

Ann Arbor Orchid Society (April 18-19) – Jerrie will be in charge

Programs

January – multiworkshop format with three topics. Brainstormed about possible topics and presenters. Will have member sales again following the same format as at last January's meeting. Rob will handle the members' sales as he did last year. Jerrie will handle the sale of Kris Garling's orchids, which are at Dot's (Dot recently received them and has repotted all and treated them for insects). We will have our raffle but no silent auction. Rob may auction off a nice plant or two if needed. Possible topics: preparing orchids for display (Lynn O'Shaughnessy? Or Dot?); mounting orchids (Jim); terrariums (Rob).

March – Neither Rob nor Doris can attend; Pete can chair the meeting; Ioana can open the Church and transport the equipment and refreshments supplies from Doris' to the meeting. Brainstormed about possible speakers. It is the first meeting after the Show; perhaps a speaker aiming at beginning growers would be appropriate.

October – which Saturday to be determined based on the meeting room's availability – Ioana will check with her liaison at the Church – Jack Shumaker would like to do a meeting similar to the October 18th, Norito Hasegawa meeting ; he plans to invite Chris Purver, the orchid curator from the Eric Young Orchid Foundation on the Island of Jersey. Board approved this multi-society meeting in 2015, details to be determined. Rob will work with Jack on the meeting.

New business

GLOS Orchid Classes at Van Atta's Greenhouse and Flower Shop in Haslett – Jerrie is organizing two orchid classes for beginning growers for the two Saturdays prior to our Show and two more for the two Saturdays following our Show. All four classes are at 11 am.

GLOS "Vendor Policy" – Grand Valley Orchid Society contacted Rob about refunding table fees in the event of some catastrophe. GLOS's policy is no refunds, although, of course, we are free to make an exception if warranted.

Next Board meeting – Monday, February 9th, 7 pm, at Ioana' house.

Rob adjourned the meeting at 8:51 p.m.

We need help with clerking during ribbon judging at this year's February Show. Clerks assist the judging teams in finding the plants entered in the class, preparing the ribbons for the winning entries, placing the ribbons on the winners, and recording the winners in the Society's official record. Your time commitment is for Saturday morning, February 28th, beginning at 7:30 a.m. (we provide you a light breakfast) and lasting until ribbon judging is concluded, about 11:00 a.m. The exact ending time depends on how many entries we have in this year's Show and how many judging teams we have to do the work. We need about thirty clerks. If we do not get enough AOS judges coming to our Show, Judging Chair Lynn O'Shaughnessy will use some of our more knowledgeable clerks to serve as lay judges in order to get the ribbon judging concluded in a timely fashion so we can admit the public to see the exhibits. All clerks are invited to be the Society's guests at the Judges' Luncheon held at the Show at about noon.

You do not need experience as a clerk in order to volunteer. We have written instructions for you, and will place you on a team with more experienced people. We want you to enjoy your first experience!

In addition to conventional clerking in the orchid portion of the Show, we need two people to clerk for Marilyn Lee in the Orchids-in-Use competition and two people to clerk for Carol Stuht in the Art competition -- she appreciates any volunteers, but especially tall persons!

Twelve GLOS members contributed two flower arrangements, assorted, beautiful foliage plants and 36 orchids in 27 different classes at the 49th SVOS Show. These orchids and arrangements captured 26 ribbons, five trophies including the best-of-show trophy and two AOS awards (on one plant). Oh, yes! And, by the way, the 50-square-foot-exhibit featuring Sharon Johnson's beautiful gray rounds won the trophy for best society exhibit and the AOS Show Trophy – these latter honors due to the artistic skill of Lynn O'Shaughnessy, who, with Doris Asher, set up the exhibit Friday and returned on Sunday afternoon to take it back to Doris' house. Society President Rob Halgren helped Doris and Lynn with takedown Sunday. Members of the Saginaw Valley group provided superb assistance both in unloading our rental van Friday afternoon and also reloading it on Sunday afternoon. Thank you so very much to them!

The star of the exhibit – dare I say of the entire Show – though, is Ioana Sonea and her gigantic Phalaenopsis Brother Little Yellowboy, which is anything but "little." It got the blue and the trophy for best Phalaenopsis; the blue and trophy for best specimen plant; and the best-of-show

trophy. As if that were not enough, the judges pulled it and awarded it both an Award of Merit of 80 points and also a Certificate of Cultural Merit of 88 points. Sheesh!!

MY PROBLEM WITH ORCHIDS IS... (This essay was written for this year's MAOC contest)

...they are an addiction.

I loved gardening and had been growing an assortment of houseplants for many years that included an interest in a few African Violets and various members of the cactus family. At the time I married my husband, my small collection was doing pretty poorly, but nevertheless, I brought the plants into my new home and began to try to breathe some life into them. It was then that my husband asked the question that he sometimes thinks he never should have asked, "Can you grow something with a flower on it?"

The next day I visited a commercial greenhouse a few towns over and came home with an orchid in bloom along with some literature on where I could order more. I joined a "blooming orchid of the month" club with another commercial firm who sent me a beautiful blooming orchid every month like clockwork. I placed my first mail order and received 6 seedlings, not having any idea how long it would take for them to bloom. It didn't matter, though, I was now an orchid grower and my collection was expanding.

About a year later, only two Christmas cactuses remained of my houseplant collection and my orchid collection had swelled to 40 plants. I was beginning to find out that keeping some of them alive was a challenge because not all orchids could survive given the same cultural conditions. Repotting? No one had told me about that. Then someone mentioned that I could get lots of information by joining an orchid society, so I did. I joined three of them.

Orchid societies were great! I had a chance to be with other addicts who were very eager to share about their successes and failures. I learned about repotting and which orchids liked it bright or shady, wet or dry. I tweaked my meager growing area to try to accommodate as many of them as I could. And did I tell you that an orchid society was a great source of obtaining more orchid plants? It was an addicts dream!

Fast forward eight years and I had filled my sunroom to the brim. The corner of my basement housed another 800 orchids or so under lights and in Orchidariums. I had humidifiers and fans running to keep my orchids comfortable and plastic stapled to the ceiling of the basement to keep the house comfortable...or maybe that was to keep my husband happy? Even with all of these lovely orchid plants, I couldn't wait to get my next fix. New orders came in at least twice a month. I knew what was coming next.

Nine years after buying my first orchid plant, I moved into my brand new greenhouse. Now I was a real orchid grower! Does it ever get old growing orchids? Not really. And, yes, I can grow something with a flower on it.

But we'll need help from you to make the show a success. The one thing we always hear back from vendors and exhibitors is how much they appreciate the help we provide them and how friendly we are. Below are some possible areas you could help in making the show a success:

In the weeks prior to the show, prepare your orchids for our display (you can learn how to do this at our January meeting). Make sure the orchids are clean and pest free. Jim Heilig is leading our display efforts.

By Wednesday night prior to the show, provide Jim the names of the orchids you are putting in the GLOS display so Jim can prepare labels and complete other paperwork and planning. He'd appreciate this information a few days earlier if possible.

Thursday night prior to the show we set up the vendor tables and display area. We could use some helping hands. This usually runs from 6:00 PM to 8:00 PM. Most of the effort is in moving and setting up tables, and preparing the tables (putting on covering and edging).

Thursday or Friday morning (very early): deliver orchids to two local TV stations as part of our publicity effort

Friday:

- o Bring your orchids to MSU prior to noon if you haven't contacted Jim to make other arrangements in advance of the show. More directions will come prior to the show.
- o Help vendors and exhibitors unload their orchids and material for the show. Help is needed from noon to 7:00 or 8:00 pm. You don't need to be there that entire time. Your bonus is early viewing of orchids that will be for sale.
- o We need your food! Although a main course is the pizza, we supplement it with other entrees donated by members who also bring in desserts, salads and other goodies. Workers get fed around 6:00 (the society covers the cost of the pizza).Saturday:

Saturday:

- o Breakfast is served early for the judges and clerks. If you haven't clerked before, this is a good way to learn what to look for in an orchid flower. You'll hear the judges discuss the merits of the flowers they are judging. You'll be teamed with experienced clerks. We try to make this fun, but it does involve about 3 hours (starting at 8:00 AM) on your feet finding orchids and placing ribbons. I've done this for a number of years, and learn something new each year. Consider volunteering to be a clerk if you haven't done this before.
- o We need your food (more food, eating is important)! Lunch is served around noon for the judges and workers. A good part of lunch is catered, but members also bring in desserts and salads and other goodies.
- o Consider helping out at the information table. We usually have 2-3 members take turns sitting at the information table. The public has questions about GLOS, what we do, about their orchids, etc. If you know a little bit, you probably know more than most people. If you can't answer a question, there is usually a member walking by that can help out.

Sunday

- o Consider helping at the information table (see above)
- o Tear down: At 4:00 on Sunday the show ends.
 - The people renting us the tables want to pick them up Sunday around 5:45
 - Vendors and exhibitors want to leave and leave quickly. What takes 1 day to set up is all torn down and cleaned up within 2 hours (4:00 – 6:00). Hopefully the vendors are leaving with only a few orchids left. If you can wheel a cart, move a cart, carry a box of orchids, you can help.
 - Help cleaning up: everything needs to be put back the way it was before the show
 - Take exhibit material back to our storage area

NOTE FROM MARILYN LEE: To all members who would like to enter a floral arrangement in our Feb. orchid show there will be printed design schedules at the January meeting. Members are encouraged to enter designs and Marilyn Lee will have orchid blooms for those that need them.
